## Back in business

June 15, 2008, turned out to be a very different kind of day from what Barry Bender had in mind. It was Father's Day, and Barry had to go to work, something to which he'd become accustomed during a long career in retail management.

But Barry knew the workday wouldn't last forever, and he had high hopes that his wife, Linda, and kids Sarah and Caleb were planning something special for later. A nice gift and a dinner featuring his favorite foods were definite possibilities.

Barry, however, wasn't feeling like his old self. "I thought something was wrong with me the night before, and on the morning of Father's Day, as I was preparing to go to work, I wasn't getting around very well at all," Barry says.

Even in hindsight, he didn't see it coming. "There wasn't any pain, but maybe I should have taken the loss of balance and dexterity in my hands more seriously," Barry says. "Maybe I could have mitigated the effects if I'd gone to the hospital the

## Looking to the future

We're currently in the midst of a strategic-planning process, a comprehensive undertaking we began in January. Formal strategic planning is something we usually do every three years, but this time we're looking ahead over the next five years.

Of course, it's very difficult to plan ahead during this economic downturn that has put so many organizations in a holding pattern. At Turnstone, we're also holding on and hoping for an end to this crisis. But regardless of the current economic situation, we must continue to plan for the future.

While our strategic-planning process is multifaceted, it has one paramount purpose: to find ways in which we can better serve our clients and their families.

First, we formed a separate committee of board members and volunteers to assess where we are and where we need to be in the next five years. Their insights have been invaluable in this planning process.

A second major part of the planning process has been visits by teams of staff members to other organizations that offer related programs and services. We've visited the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago, the Chicago-area Easter Seals DuPage, an early-learning center in Indianapolis, and an adult day center in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

During these visits, we've looked for best practices we can adopt. We've also looked for new ideas that we can implement—if they're a good fit for us. Just some of the areas we've examined

at these other sites were fundraising, marketing, adaptive sports, fitness centers, and staff training. We have also been exploring areas where we can develop strategic alliances.

The third main approach in our planning process has been interviewing stakeholders: clients and their families, volunteers, members of the board of directors, staff members, and representatives from the community at large. In the past, we've had our stakeholders complete surveys, but this time, we opted for a more personal approach. We spent time in face-to-face conversations.

The interviewees were very open in their responses, and the high marks we've received have been gratifying. Those interviewed have told us to continue what we're doing—because we're doing it very well. That has served as an affirmation that we're following our mission and that our programs are making a real difference in the lives of people with disabilities and their families.

I was very moved by the stories shared by clients and their loved ones. They say they're happy they found Turnstone. They say their lives have been enriched by Turnstone. And, some clients say Turnstone has saved their lives. That's a pretty powerful statement. How could you not want to come to work every day, knowing that your organization has had that kind of positive impact on other people's well-being?

People also shared their dreams for Turnstone, which include a larger

facility, more programs and activities, and expanding our services into more counties.

We're currently analyzing all the information we've gathered during this strategic-planning process, and we plan to share that information with you on our Web site, [www.turnstone.org](http://www.turnstone.org), after July 1, and in future issues of *Topics*.

I can't say that those of us at Turnstone don't share some of the dreams for our agency that were expressed by the people we interviewed. With your continued support, we will turn some of those dreams into reality.

night before. I'd had some issues with my blood pressure, but I thought it was under control. Since then, I've read a lot about the warning signs, and thinking back, I'd still have to say, 'This couldn't be a stroke!'

It was a stroke. Linda rushed Barry to Parkview Hospital, where over the next few days, he continued to lose function on the left side of his body. At one point, he couldn't use his left leg at all.

Barry was an inpatient at Parkview for two-and-a-half weeks. "Parkview provided very good care, and the results were pretty dramatic, especially after I underwent electrical-stimulus therapy," Barry recalls. "I remember thinking at the time that if I could walk without a cane after a year, that wouldn't be so bad."



What was bad was the cost of the physical therapy Barry needed before he'd be able to return to work. Barry had been the maintenance supervisor responsible for 12 Kohl's stores in the Midwest. Just two months before the stroke, his position was downsized. Kohl's then offered him a job managing a department at Kohl's Northcrest Shopping Center in Fort Wayne.

"Kohl's has been very good to me in that respect," Barry says. "Companies don't usually keep people around after downsizing, so I was very fortunate that Kohl's offered me another job."

Still, with Linda back in school as full-time college student and two kids still at home (their three other children are grown), there wasn't enough money to continue outpatient therapy at Parkview Rehabilitation Center, where Barry had begun going after being discharged from the hospital.

"I burned through my therapy benefits at Parkview Rehab, and I couldn't afford therapy on my own," Barry says. "Then, I was referred to Turnstone. The people at Turnstone helped me find a way to afford therapy. I'm the family breadwinner, and my goal was to get back to work as soon as possible. Turnstone couldn't have done a better job of helping me accomplish that."

At Turnstone, Barry began receiving physical therapy from Jeff Lambert and occupational therapy from Nancy Shepler. "They joke that PT—physical therapy—

really stands for 'pain and torture,' and there's some truth to that; you don't go there to relax," Barry says. "They push you pretty hard, and that's a good thing."

After just a couple of months of therapy at Turnstone, Barry was able to return to work on a part-time basis in September. Gradually adding hours to his schedule each week, he was back to work full time by October. "My job is physically demanding, and I was exhausted after an eight-hour shift. But it was good to be back."

Today, Barry no longer receives therapy, but he continues to come to Turnstone's Health and Wellness Center twice a week. During each session, he spends 20 minutes on a treadmill and 20 minutes on an elliptical machine before hitting other exercise machines for two sets of 12 repetitions. "I'm ready for my recliner after that," Barry says.

"I'm seeing outstanding progression in my physical abilities," Barry continues. "I'm able to do more, and I have more energy. I can do just about anything I need to get done."

Something Barry really wanted to accomplish was to participate in the Living Christmas Tree Foundation's production at the Scottish Rite Center last year. Thanks to therapy and determination, he was able to take his place in the performance. "That was definitely a milestone for me," Barry says.

Whether he's using his regained abilities for work or for recreation, Barry attributes his quick turnaround to Turnstone. "Turnstone has been a true godsend—I can't say enough about the agency," he says. "It's an excellent facility, and the people there are really dedicated. The people at Turnstone are very high on the list of people I admire. I credit them for my being where I am today. I don't know where I'd be without Turnstone." ■

# Adaptive sports and recreation

## Power Soccer

The Fearless Flyers and Fantastic Flyers finished second and fourth, respectively, in the National Power Soccer Association Midwest Regional in Minneapolis in March. The Fearless Flyers automatically advanced to the national tourney in Fishers, Indiana, this June. Based on their record, the Fantastic Flyers also will advance.

## Wheelchair basketball

### Prep

In March, the Prep Flyers advanced to the final four of the National Junior Wheelchair Basketball Tournament in Denver before losing to the Courage team. The Flyers then bounced back to beat the Bay Cruisers, 18-14, and finish No. 3 in the nation for the second straight year.

### Varsity

The Varsity Flyers, Midwest Conference champions, were ranked seventh in the nation as they headed into the National Junior Wheelchair Basketball Tournament in Denver in March. In their final game of the tourney, the Flyers topped conference rival the Junior Michigan Thunderbirds, 49-40, to finish No. 9 in the country for 2008-09.

### Bandits

The Fort Wayne Bandits, Division III Bluegrass Invitational champions, were ranked second in their division entering March's National Wheelchair Basketball Tournament in Denver. The Bandits finished in the No. 3 spot in their division for the second consecutive year.

## Pushing the envelope
